Introduction

For anyone who is looking to invest money in the share market, one of the biggest challenges is the issue of which stocks to buy, and when to buy them. There are many different approaches to this dilemma, and many finance professionals have widely different approaches which makes it very confusing for retail investors.

Of the many different strategies that can be used, some are more successful than others. One of the strategies that Robert uses, entitled "Robert's Weekly Watch List strategy", is introduced in the **eBook (PDF) Article TA-6050** (readers are encouraged to view it). This strategy, and the Weekly Watch List document (sample in Figure 1 below), are both described in this eBook Article. (And we must caution that there is no guarantee that this approach is profitable — it is described here purely for education as an example).

After utilising the original Weekly Watch List approach for some time, and further studying the detail, Robert decided in late 2016 that it was time to tweak the details of that approach. After several attempts and much testing, the details of the "Version 6" of the tweaked strategy can now be shared.

The details of the Weekly Watch List strategy (version 6)

are explained in this Article TA-6055. The real purpose of this eBook Article is twofold. Firstly to document the details of Robert's revised Weekly Watch List strategy and explain the tweaked contents

to the table that is shared and published on a weekly basis. The second purpose for this Article is to offer examples of the following: (a) some of the technical analysis items which can be used to assist with entry criteria; and (b) one way to use BullCharts to find candidate stocks and to allocate a ranking "score" value.

This strategy is based heavily on key technical analysis observations of recent share price performance, and which are readily viewable on a price chart with the appropriate technical analysis chart indicators. This includes: the ROAR, MACD, Momentum, and Wilson ATR Trailing Stop (details below).

NOTE: Any one stock-selection strategy might work for some people, but not for others. It is dependent on many complex factors including: which market (eg. Australian stocks, or commodities, or currencies, etc.), the state of the market (ie. bullish, bearish, non-trending, etc.), the very specific stocks in question, and the personality of the investor/trader. The latter one is a very complex one and can exhibit much more influence on success or failure than any other factor.
