


## About this presentation...

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More about this presentation...

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Many investors and traders have a go at dividend harvesting without due consideration for some of the traps and pitfalls. Their goal is to harvest the dividends without thinking much about the share price, often because they have heard that:

"...the share price tends to fall on the ex-div date by the amount of the dividend".

What they don't realise is that this is absolute rubbish. It's a *furphy*.



## Dividend "principles"

- It is common for the share price to rally into the ex-div date, and then...
- To fall on the ex-div date by the amount of the dividend.

# BUT!! Is this information true and reliable??



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## Dividend principles

We often hear this information about dividends.

That a company's share price typically rallies for days (or several weeks) into the ex-dividend date, and then on the ex-dividend date it typically falls by the amount of the dividend.

HOWEVER, as we will see in this presentation, this was not a common observation in the August 2019 dividend season, nor in my observations since, in the years 2020-2023!
